
















In art class, sixth grade students worked hard to create a charcoal drawing of a church. Each student began by finding a picture of a Catholic Church. These included churches found locally along with churches from around the country. Then, they sketched out their church's design. After the churches were drawn, the students used charcoal pencils to add details and shade their churches.

Charcoal techniques have been used to produce art for hundreds of years. By changing the pressure and direction of the pencil when drawing, the students could create different effects in their pictures. They were able to blend or highlight areas to create varying colors and textures. This project enabled the students to try a very popular art medium!
