In April, the sixth graders went on a field trip to the Holocaust Center of Pittsburgh located on Chatham University's campus. This trip tied in with a memoir the students had read earlier this year in literature, Four Perfect Pebbles, which was about one family's experience during the Holocaust.

First, students listened to a guest speaker, Lynn Ravas, who told the story of her father, Fred, who had been a Jewish child living in Germany in the 1930's. Fred was an orphan in the town of Dinslaken when Kristallnacht occurred. No longer able to stay in Germany, he was moved to an orphanage in the Netherlands. Luckily, Fred was adopted by an American couple and grew up in New York City. Ms. Ravas's moving narrative demonstrated how one act of kindness can change someone's life.

Next, the students were able to explore the Holocaust Center's exhibit. This included artwork from before WWII and Holocaust artifacts. Many pieces of art on display commemorated the victims of the Holocaust. One section of the exhibit described antisemitism and how Pittsburgh was responding. A student's winning project from the Waldman International Arts and Writing competition was on display, as well. Perhaps the most memorable piece was a Torah which had been saved from a German synagogue during Kristallnacht.

Overall, this was a very educational and moving experience.
